## ON THE ROAD WITH CAST A 2010 - "MY BIRTHDAY IN MANILA"

Hello to everyone back home on the other side of the world. This year's birthday was probably the most memorable birthday of my life. I started off the day with breakfast at my host family's house, which might as well be a resort oasis for the Philippines. There are six of us staying here this time around and it is absolutely gorgeous.

After breakfast we all headed out for Regional Learning around Manila, and caught taxis from our host family to the Philippine Red Cross headquarters. If anyone has ever experienced traffic of any sort... you haven't experienced ANYTHING until you are in the traffic in Manila. People hold infants on motorcycles and in a twenty minute cabride we may come close to being in an accident 5-7 times. SCARY!

The cast sang me (conga line style) Happy Birthday (Happy Birthday to you, Happy Birthday, HAPPY Birthday to you) and they gave me a huge group hug. (Huge as in 100 person, group hug... I felt the love). We then all crowded into Jeepney's to head out to Gawad Kalinga. There really is no way to explain Gawad Kalinga (meaning "to give care") without seeing it. It is a housing area that is being built in the slum areas around Manila. We went to

the Baseco site which was an area of slums that had been burned completely down in a fire and now about 300,000 families are displaced. Gawad Kalinga is much like our version of Habitat for Humanity. They have what is called "sweat equity". If you qualify for a house (which means you had to have lived in the slums before the fire and are still currently living in the slums), you have to help build it. Once it is built, you can own it. We were given a tour of the newly built homes which are colorful and the people are so proud of having them to live in. The families wanted us to walk through them to see everything that they had. They would run up

and grab our hands and say "come look, come see" and it was heartbreaking because the best home that they had ever lived in....were less than anything I've ever seen in my entire life. That is until, the cast continued our tour and wound up smack dab in the middle of the slums of Manila. We spent a few hours playing on a playground with hundreds of local children. All dirty, all wanting piggyback rides and for their picture to be taken...all giggling and playing with our hair and playing ring-around-therosey. Much like any other set of 4-10 year olds I've ever met. Kids just want to be kids. For a few hours in the morning I was given the opportunity to hold a two month old baby Michalee

(Mike-ah-lee). He was two months old and perfect. Such a precious baby! Michalee and I had a fun time trying to stay in the shade which shielded us slightly from the 100 degree weather that everyone else was

playing in.

After play time we walked back through the Gawad Kalinga site to where they have a school and we performed a few songs for them as well as watched a little children's group dance for us to "every move I make I make in you" which brought back quite a few

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memories. We then had a two hour dance party in front of the school with all of the little kids. After that we sat down in the shade and had our sack lunches.

After lunch we left Baseco and were given a tour around the National Museum of the Philippines. There we saw various cargo that was found from the San Diego shipwreck (the flagship for the United States Pacific fleet which escorted convoys through Europe in 1917). Also in the museum we saw actual burial jars that literally still had bones inside of them and a video about how they used to preserve dead bodies.

After the museum we headed out to Fort Santiago for a few hours of free time to wander. Then we had a wonderful dinner at a fancy restaurant

downtown. Some traditional dancers came and performed for us as well as giving us the chance to learn some of the dances. One of them consists of them banging wooden sticks on the ground and banging them together while dancers jump in and out of the sticks without getting their feet caught. Because it was my birthday they let me try it. It was pretty fun, I'll have to admit.

Then we all piled into taxis and came home. By the time I got home it was after nine at night.... I was sun burnt.

So that was my birthday in Manila. I don't think I'll ever forget it!

## **ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT:**

Yamil Torres Culiacan, MEXICO Cast A 2006 UWPIAA Era Rep 2006-2010

# How did you decide to join UWP?

I remember listening to the radio during one of the UWP visits to my hometown (Aguascalientes, Mexico). They were interviewing some UWP students and they were sharing their experiences traveling to different parts of the world with friends from different nationalities; at that moment I knew that it was something that I wanted to be part of. I found out more about UWP and learned that besides traveling and having fun, they also did community service projects and performed the show: the whole concept of the program looked very interesting for me. On the last visit of UWP to my city (2000) I went to see the show and Scott, a guy from Canada interviewed me, I was accepted and was supposed to travel in 2001, but was not able to do it until 2006 with an amazing cast of young people that I now call my family.

# Describe your experience with UWP?

Life-changing, powerful, unique, incredible, amazing, very emotional, inspiring... Traveling with UWP as a student and then as a staff member, gave me the opportunity to experience things that I would not have been able to if I hadn't been part of this program. I did my first snow angel in Denver, communicated with my Japanese host families without knowing the language, visited

the site where the Berlin wall was in Germany, rode elephants and pet tigers in Thailand, was received by the First Lady of Mexico in the Presidential House, worked and interacted with people from the slums in the Philippines and saw kiwis for the very first time in New Zealand. UWP gave me the opportunity to impact others' lives in a positive way and my life was impacted immensely.

# How did UWP affect your view of the world and your role in it?

It made me realize that we all live on the same planet and that we are brothers and sisters; regardless of your nationality, religion, the color of your skin, sexual preference, age, etc. The world became "smaller" for me, and I was empowered with the idea of doing small things that can affect your community, leading by example to encourage people to do positive changes that can create a global impact.

# HOW TO WRITE AN UP WITH PEOPLE CLOSING SONG!

As the current Music Director for Up with People, I have been given the opportunity of a lifetime. Following in the footsteps of some of the most talented men that I know, Herb Allen and Bill Welsh, is an honor that I appreciate every day of my life.

In the early fall of 2009, Up with People's Production team, Eric Lentz (Vice President of Production/Cast Operations), Ken Leist (Assistant Producer/Choreographer) and myself, met to review the show that we had just sent on the road with Cast B 2009. We were lucky enough to have the input from some very talented friends during this particular meeting: Lynne Morris, the Director of the Up with People show for many years, and Angel Cortes (81D), who was able to

come and see the cast's dress rehearsal. Angel and his Orlando-based 62 Music Group have been contributors to the Up with People show for the last few years; songs such as "Sing Your Song" "Arm Yourself" and "With One Heart" were all collaborations between the Up with People creative team and 62 Music.

After an energetic first day of meetings, we returned for day two ready to finalize our thoughts and get ready for January staging. But, before we had even finished our

greetings, Angel told us all about an amazing idea that had kept him awake the night before. He wanted to see what we all thought about writing a new song for the show. But not just a new song: a collaboration between Up with People, 62 Music and the musical founders of Up with People! What if we wrote a new closing song with the

Colwell Brothers and Herb Allen?

Of course our answer was a resounding YES! All that was left to be discussed was the logistics of creating a song with people from different parts of the country. So, after proposing the idea to Ralph and Paul Colwell, we made plans to meet for a songwriting day. Attending the meeting from 62 Music were Angel and Rod Maurice, a co-writer and producer of all of the songs written by 62 Music; Ralph and Paul, and Eric, Ken and myself from Up with People. Angel hosted the meeting at the historic Brown Palace Hotel in downtown Denver, where we gathered for a day of big picture discussions, lyric and musical ideas and even some makeshift recordings via voice mail. It was during these meetings that the basic

structure, idea and hook for the song were created.

After the meeting, the Colwells were charged with finishing the lyrical thought of the song. The thought that came out of the session was that we wanted to wrap up the show with a similar thought that the opening song had introduced. The opening song of

the show, "Sing Your Song", talks about the unique gift or talent that each of us has to share, our "song for the world". We wanted to wrap up this thought with each of us asking how we can do our part, by asking the question "what can I do to better our world?" That thought led us to the song title of "One Person (What Can I Do?)," that lets each of us know, though we are just one person, we each can make a difference in the world.

After musical and lyrical exchanges between Colorado, Florida, Arizona and Seattle, we were ready for the final sessions to finish the song. In early De-

cember, I had the opportunity to go to Tucson to finally get the opportunity to involve Herb Allen in the project.

Then, one week after my trip to Tucson, I traveled to Orlando to finish arranging and recording the song in the 62 Music recording studio. The last section of music to be written was the ending of the song – the big finish that we hoped would bring the audiences to their feet in thundering applause. So, with the help of some of the most amazing musicians I've ever met, we arranged an ending to the song that we all were very proud of. I returned to Denver as Rod recorded UWP alumna Jessica Rojas (07B) on the female solo and then

created the final mix of the song.

When asked about the project, Angel replied: "I have always be a big fan of the Colwell Brothers and wanted to come up with a way to show my appreciation for their unselfish commitment to UWP. I thought why not include them and Herb Allen in a collaboration with my team at 62 Music and also in-

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clude Eric, Michael and Ken so to have a bit of the past, the present and the future in the project. It was such a great experience for all of us and I think it exceeded all of our expectations, so much that we plan on doing it again and including other previous UWP song writers in our collaborating process."

The song "One Person (What Can I Do?)" is a huge success with the cast and our audiences on tour. It is available on the "Song for the World" CD (available on tour with the cast or on our website www.upwithpeople.org) and will be available soon thru all the major digital download sites.
